Midland students experience change of pace with relaxed lifestyle in Costa Rica

Four Midland Spanish students enjoyed the friendly, relaxed, simplified lifestyle of tropical Costa Rica for three weeks this summer. Julie Martin, Kate Ellison, Laura Vetter and Tara Wynkoop participated in a homestay program offered by Davis and Ana Short of South Prairie Educational Services. All four stayed with families in Grecia, a mountain city in the heart of Costa Rica.

Julie and Tara lived next door to each other and their sisters went to the same school. When they got frustrated with Spanish they could go next door and find someone to talk English. "It just wracked your brain to have to concentrate for that length of time on the language," Julie explained.

Girls on the football team? Yes, you heard correctly-Girls on the football team, and in little 'ole Wyoming, lowa none the less.

A new wrinkle has been added to the Midland football team this year---girl trainers! Four young ladies, Paula Trimble, Susie Norris, Susanne Ahrendsen, and Rite Thomsen have received instruction in first aid, and in such duties as wrapping and tapping ankles, etc., and will compromise the training staff this fall. Though it is new to Midland, the idea of girl trainers itself is not unique. Coach Stamp had girls serve as trainers when he coached at Vinton, and he knows of several other coaches who have implemented the idea during the past few years.

Stamp states that girls have proven very competent when serving in this capacity. "Maybe it's the 'mother instinct' in them, but girls seem to take their job more seriously and are more conscientious in performing duties of this kind than most boys I have seen at this age."

Note: Coach Stamp worked at Midland from 1974 – 1977. He had a total of 42 years coaching softball, baseball and football at 11 area high schools and a small college.

Approve Consolidation Of School District By Big Margin Last Monday

Wyoming voters Monday approved consolidation of the town school district and seven rural school districts. The action was the second successful consolidation in recent weeks in south Jones county. Previously Oxford Junction school districts were consolidated.

Consolidation follows a general plan of school district reorganization in the state.

Those rural school districts which are now merged with Wyoming are Niles, Pleasant Ridge, South Madison, Madison Center, Oak Grove, Baldwin and South Prairie. Valley and a part of Oxford No. 3 are expected to join the district after it is set up.

Free rural mail deliveries are being established in many parts of Iowa. These systems are established by the government upon filling of certain requirements by the applicants. This vicinity has had free rural delivery for many years through the medium of the milk wagons whose routes extend to almost all parts of the territory reached by the Wyoming office. In this manner the farmer receives his mail each morning with not failures as the milk wagon of Iowa is a regular in its trips to the creamery as is the cow of Iowa from the pasture to the barn.

Those who crossed Bear creek on Main street last Saturday night were wicked (confounded) because they stood in slippery places. The walk as it now lays during the construction of the new iron bridge, rests upon the banks of the creek and the rains of the day raised the water over the walk, and when the "mighty torrent" had receded the planks were glazed with mud and slime. The night was as densely dark as democracy's deeds, making the situation extremely dangerous to the pedestrian. Some knight with an illuminated proboscis or highcolored cranium decorations should be stationed at the crossing when the moon goes down.

The Anamosa Eureka: August 6, 1885 - Page 2

The Wyoming Cricket Club was organized at the office of F. O. Ellison last Tuesday evening, and Geo. A. Lindsay was elected captain; Geo. W. Wilkins, secretary, and Dr. A. W. Hepler, treasurer. Twenty members have been secured, an outfit ordered and business will be inaugurated in J. B. Wherry's pasture so soon as the weather will permit. Regular meetings will be held on the first Monday evening of each month, when applications for membership will be received and balloted upon, but no person under 18 years of age is eligible. Cricket is a rather robust exercise, healthful and pleasant.


