Wyoming Christmas Lights History: We get lots of inquiries about the lights and there is little written history. Based on the following article from the **December 2, 1937,** Wyoming Journal, it looks like they might have begun that year.

"Wyoming, famous for its fall celebration, has done it again, this time with pretty colors and Christmas trees.

Now traffic goes through town between lanes of evergreen trees sparkling with lights of all colors at night. Arching across the street are rows of colored lights, and over the middle of the street hangs a great star, glowing white when dusk falls and extending to all in huge red letters the town's wish of a "Merry Christmas".

Travelers who have passed through dozens of towns stop their automobiles and say 'Mister, I'm telling you, you've got the prettiest, most Christmasy town I've ever seen.'"

The lights have been featured on TV stations from Moline to Omaha. Many news articles have been written about them. Bill Wundram from the Quad City Times wrote several articles as did Dave Radsal of the Cedar Rapids Gazette. Bill always enjoyed stopping at Virginia Pace's café for one of her LARGE pieces of pie and always wrote about it. The Des Moines Register sent a photographer out as part of their Iowa Christmas lights competition – and our lights WON!!!

The project started with a group of volunteers, passed to the Commercial Club, then the Fair Association, and now the Lions Club. During WWII a handful of men left behind were able to get them up. Purdy Reitz and Cecil Lambert were in charge for many years, until Cecil's untimely death due to a drunk driver. It continues today with the help of many volunteers, including 4-H and FFA members and the support of business with the equipment to get the lines in place.

In case you are wondering, there are over 1,200 large bulbs, 1,000 tree bulbs, over 18,000 feet of wire, and approximately 110 connections to go wrong.
